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# LETIZIA'S DO'S AT THE INTERVIEWS

### **Interview Dos:**

- Research the Company: Before the interview, make sure you know about the company's culture, products, and values. This shows your genuine interest.
- Dress Appropriately: Dress in a way that aligns with the company culture, ensuring you look professional, polished, and put together.
- Practice Your Answers: Prepare for common interview questions and rehearse your answers so you can confidently articulate your skills and experiences.

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- Be Punctual: Arriving on time (or early) is a key part of showing respect and professionalism. It gives you a calm start and avoids rushing.
- Show Enthusiasm and Confidence: Be positive, smile, and show excitement about the role. Employers love to see candidates who are engaged and motivated.



# LETIZIA'S DONT'S AT THE INTERVIEWS

- Don't Badmouth Past Employers: Even if your previous job wasn't a great experience, avoid speaking negatively about past employers or colleagues. It reflects poorly on you.
- Don't Lie About Your Experience: Be honest about your qualifications and experience. Employers will appreciate your integrity, and dishonesty can be easily spotted.
- Don't Fidget or Appear Distracted: Nervous habits like tapping your feet or constantly looking around can signal to the interviewer that you're not fully engaged.
- Don't Interrupt the Interviewer: Let the interviewer speak and listen attentively before you answer. Interrupting can seem disrespectful and make you appear impatient.
- Don't Over-share Personal Information: Stick to relevant information regarding the job and your qualifications.
   Avoid discussing personal life details unless they directly relate to the role.
